ALDAM, PEASE, BIRCHALL AND CO

This firm of woollen merchants was established in Leeds in the early eighteenth century, probably by Gervas Benson of Armley, an inventory of whose goods, dated April 1758 appears in item 4 below. In 1735 he had married Barbara, sister of John Aldam of Leeds (1718-1776) and it appears that by the 1760s John Aldam was in partnership with Gervas's son William (1736-1804). The partnership was enlarged in about 1767 by the admission of Thomas Benson.

By the beginning of the nineteenth century the firm was trading under the name of William and Gervas Benson and Co with the partnership comprising William Benson, Gervas Benson, John Heaton and John Pease. This partnership was dissolved in December 1803 and from the beginning of the following year the business was carried on by John Pease, John Heaton (died c1812) William Pease (known as Aldam from 1810) and Thomas Benson Pease under the name of Pease, Heaton and Pease.

By 1816 it appears that the business was known as Aldam, Pease and Co with its partners being William Aldam, T B Pease and T. Birchall, the latter having become a partner about 1812. The partnership was dissolved in 1839 when its members were William Aldam, TB Pease, E. Birchall and John Heaton.

The surviving records comprise a series of nineteen sales ledgers, 1738-1839, which begin when Gervas Benson was already well-established in business. There is a cash book 1760-1782; three purchase and disbursement ledgers, 1809-1825; two stock books, 1811-1818 and 1832-1839; a bank book, 1833-1839, and a single day book for the months September to December 1838.

These records do not appear in the catalogue compiled by Patricia Hudson, The West Riding Wool Textile Industry (Edington, Wiltshire, 1975).

- 25 Stock Book, titled 'Trade Accts 1838-9' 1832-1839
 The accounts fall into four sections
 as specified above, but stock and debts
 are not individually itemised
- Documents formerly enclosed in the above early 19 cent 5 items
 Includes a memorandum of the capital share of partners each year from 1799 to 1839
