Wrote many articles for *Gloucestershire Countryside* between 1937 and 1955. Some articles written jointly with D. Albino (possibly his wife, Diana). D. Albino's last published article was in 1969. Subject of articles: mostly folkways including music, vernacular architecture, wagons, millstones, some biographies.

Known in Cheltenham as an artist (watercolors and oils). Fine draughtsman; many of his articles were accompanied by detailed scale drawings as well as his photographs.

Published several arrangements of folk songs which he and others collected. Mostly voice and piano, at least one choral arrangement. Published by Curwen.

Once lectured in Cheltenham on his experiences as a folk music collector in Eastern Europe.

Founder of the North Cotswold Music Festival and had adjudicated on several occasions at music festivals in the district. Conducted several choral societies.

Involved in the work of the Council for the Preservation of Rural England and was active in the Gloucester Branch (committee member).

Collection of slides and photographs (many related to the articles in GC) deposited in the Gloucester Record Office (Ref. D2600) and date from ca. 1939-1956

Collection of water colour paintings (wagons) in Cheltenham Art Gallery; deposited in 196(4?)

Instrumental in obtaining a number of craft items for the "Cotswold Bygones" Collection gathered together by the late Mr. D.W. Herdman, Curator of the Cheltenham Museum and Art Gallery.

Bob Arnold acquired the collection some time after Albino's death. Albino's widow said Albino wanted him to have them.
