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INTRODUCTION

by John H. Harvey

WINCHESTER COLLEGE is reputed the first of the English public schools and might be expected to preserve many records valuable for the history of education. On the whole, this is not so, since the school's educational functions were discharged by the teaching staff, unburdened by the Founder's Statutes with any duty to preserve documents. The Statutes had, nevertheless, made provision

for the College muniments, and care has been continuous.

When William of Wykeham became bishop of Winchester in 1366 he succeeded to one of the largest incomes in England and began to spend on a vast scale, not for his own benefit, but to discharge his debt to his parents and his country. After providing a chantry at Southwick Priory for the souls of his father and mother, he put into operation, step by step, a plan for the improvement of English religion, education and administration. In Oxford he bought land for a new college; a schoolmaster was appointed to teach a group of boys at Winchester; statutes were drafted and buildings planned. In spite of setbacks due to vicissitudes of his political career, Wykeham reached the stage of juridical foundation within fifteen years of taking possession of his see. His plan was for two separate colleges, the junior at Winchester and the senior at Oxford, linked together to provide not only a complete education, but a religious career, for a picked body of pupils. Specifically the aim was to replenish the administrative class, depleted by the three dreadful plagues of 1348, 1361 and 1369; for it was from the educated clergy that the 14th-century civil service was mainly recruited.

Wykeham had himself been educated in the ancient Grammar School of Winchester, and it was in the ecclesiastical Soke just outside the city's jurisdiction that he acquired a site for the new school. The buildings of the senior college at Oxford were in course of erection from 1380 to 1386; those at Winchester followed, from 1387 to 1394.² Meanwhile Winchester College had been founded by deed in 1382, and properties were being acquired for its endowment. As bishop of the wealthiest English diocese, Wykeham had exceptional opportunities for finding good investments, and between 1381 and 1398 he built up an important collection of manors, estates and churches, likely to prove both safe and profitable as a source of income. When the Warden and 70 Scholars of

Winchester entered into their new buildings in 1394, the College

already possessed a good many records.

Firstly there were the documents of foundation: Wykeham's own charter and instruments of royal and papal approval; secondly, title to the properties on whose sites the college buildings stood; and thirdly the records of estates with which the institution was being endowed, comprising in some cases documents of title as far back as the 11th century. To these static groups of existing material were to be added the results of the College's administration. In the final version of the Statutes, promulgated in 1400, Wykeham provided both for preparation and preservation of records. The sealed copies of the Statutes of both Colleges, at Winchester and at Oxford, issued in duplicate, were to remain permanently on the premises; and since every member of the collegiate body took oath to abide by the Statutes there was a strong incentive to proper archival administration.

The records produced and preserved according to this plan, and for the most part still surviving, include indentures of the Scholars elected annually and a complete Register of Scholars from 1394; Registers of the oaths taken by Scholars (on reaching 15) and by the adult Fellows (on admission) to abide by the Statutes; annual accounts kept by two Fellows chosen to serve as Bursars; Accounts of College servants and of bailiffs and others in charge of the estates; Court Rolls of the College Manors; Inventories of College property and of Library Books; Registers of leases and other documents under the College Seal; records of Lawsuits; and genealogical records of the Founder's Kin, who were entitled to preferential admission as Scholars and given other privileges to compensate Wykeham's family for their loss of the great personal fortune he was applying to public purposes. From 1394 onwards records have been produced in most of these classes or their modern equivalents, though legislation has brought some to an end. Thus in 1857 the privileges of Founder's Kin were abolished by the Oxford University Commissioners; in 1874 new methods were adopted under fresh Statutes made by the new Governing Body appointed as a result of the Public Schools Commission; the Law of Property Act 1922 and the subsequent legislation of 1925 ended the manorial system and the production of Court Rolls.

Among the records the annual account rolls are of outstanding importance as a body of continuous information on economic conditions from the 14th century until now. They are supplemented by estate accounts for College Manors and these in several cases stretch back for a century or more before the land came into College ownership. The accounts are often paralleled by series of Court Rolls and Rentals. All these records are rich in material for

the history of families and of places spread over a wide region of southern England. This extends from Essex, London and Surrey to Dorset, Somerset, Gloucestershire and Herefordshire, but the greatest concentration of material is for Hampshire, the Isle of Wight, and Wiltshire. Estates in Middlesex bought by the Founder had to be surrendered to Henry VIII in 1543 in exchange for lands elsewhere to an equivalent value. A sprinkling of the Middlesex records survives among the College Muniments, while the new properties brought with them many documents of great importance, as will be seen. Apart from a few exchanges the properties, being held in mortmain, could not be alienated until after the passing of the Universities and College Estates Act of 1858. Since then old estates have been sold and new properties bought, but in order to maintain the historical value of the archives as a whole it has been the practice of the College to reserve the ancient documents when disposing of lands. On the other hand some ancient documents

have been obtained with properties purchased since 1858.

Before passing on to an account of the muniments and their custody it may be as well to give a brief notice of the College endowments which have given rise to all the ancient records of property. The original estates given by Wykeham were, in order of acquisition, Downton Rectory Manor, Wilts., and Eling, Hants., in 1385; half of Coombe Bisset, Wilts., in 1386; then Ropley and Meonstoke, both in Hants., in 1391. At this time a large block of properties came in from the purchase of alien priories subject to St.-Valery-sur-Mer (the churches of Hampton-on-Thames, Heston, Isleworth and Twickenham, Middlesex); to the house of the Holy Trinity on Mont-St.-Katherine, Rouen (the manor and church of Harmondsworth, Middlesex); and to the abbey of Tiron (Hamblerice and Andwell in Hants., with a scattering of members elsewhere; St. Cross in the Isle of Wight; and Titley in Herefordshire). Lastly, the Founder bought the Manor of Durrington, Wilts., and a moiety of Vernhamsdean, Hants., in 1398. A number of small properties, mainly in Hampshire, was bought by the College in the next 150 years, while others were given or bequeathed. The most important were Andover Rectory, acquired in 1413; Hambledon Camoys, Hants., in 1414; and Barton Oratory in the Isle of Wight in 1440. These were followed in 1446 by John Fromond's bequest of Allington in South Stoneham, and Fernhill in Milton, both in Hants., in support of his chantry in the College. Merstone Manor in the Isle of Wight was added in 1472.

The loss of the Middlesex properties in 1543 was compensated by the manors of Moundsmere and Stubbington in Portsea (formerly of Southwick Priory); Woodmancote, Hants., and Piddletrenthide, Dorset (from Hyde Abbey, Winchester); Sydling, Dorset (Milton

Abbey); Milborne Port, Somerset (Circumcester Abbey); some small pieces of land that had belonged to St. Mary's Abbey, Winchester, and to Quarr Abbey; and the sites of all four of the Winchester friaries. Besides all these the exchange included the manor of Enford, Wilts., which had belonged to Winchester Cathedral priory. The King's title to dispose of Enford was bad, and in 1551 Edward VI had to give further estates in lieu: the manors of Ash in Surrey (from Chertsey Abbey); Minterne, Dorset (Cerne Abbey); Salperton, Glos., (like Milborne Port, a former possession of Cirencester); Seavington (Glastonbury Abbey) and Longload, both in Somerset, the latter a parcel of Templecombe Preceptory of the Hospitallers; and North Bradley, Wilts., (from Edington Priory). By the middle of the 16th century the College estates had taken on an almost static form, though some property was bought at North Warnborough, Hants., in 1624, and in 1762 an estate in Essex (Nazeing, Great Parndon and Roydon parishes) was bequeathed to the College. In 1824 Milborne Port was exchanged for an estate in Sherborne Wyke and Bradford Abbas, Dorset. Though many Middlesex documents left the College in 1543, and most of the manorial records of Milborne Port in 1824, the estate muniments include substantial blocks of material for all of the places mentioned.

While the archives form a continuous series of documents arising from the administration of the college and its estates, from the foundation on 20 October 13824 onwards to the present, the College Muniments described in the present List are regarded as including all material produced down to the supersession of the Founder's Statutes in 1873,5 together with such documents of earlier date than 1382 as have come into College possession as part of its endowments or in the course of administration; and also all manorial records down to the last enfranchisements of copyholds. The total number of separate items in the Muniments is about 36,000, the earliest being dated A.D. 900. There are four Anglo-Saxon charters, a deed of c. 1090, documents of title in increasing numbers from the middle of the 12th century, estate accounts from 1246, court rolls from 1280, and correspondence beginning in the 12th century. Most of the material earlier than 1382 is monastic in origin, reaching the Gollege either on the acquisition of certain alien priories, or after the general Dissolution

under an exchange of 1543 with Henry VIII.

The muniments are remarkable for their wide scope and also for their generally excellent state of preservation, as well as for the fact that they have been made and preserved in accordance with explicit directions of the Founder's Statutes. Thus Rubric II involved the keeping of records of Founder's Kin; Rubric III the Election Indentures; Rubrics V and VI the Registers of Oaths of Fellows

and Scholars; Rubric VIII the Register of Admissions of Scholars; Rubric XI the Bursars' Annual Accounts; Rubric XIV the Hall Books; Rubric XVIII the annual Vouchers for expenses; Rubric XXXII the Registers of Leases; Rubric XXXIII the preservation of Title Deeds, Court Rolls, and other manorial and estate documents; and also of Annual Inventories; Rubric XXXVI the preparation of Accounts of Ministers, including Reeves, Bailiffs and Rent-Collectors of the College estates as well as the College Servants such as the Manciple, Baker, Butcher and others; Rubric XXXIX the Bursars' Indentures of the annual Compotus, and records of Lawsuits; Rubric XLII the Library Inventories; and Rubric XLII the perpetual preservation of the sealed copies of the Statutes of the College and of New College, Oxford.

Extensive accumulations exist of all the classes mentioned, in many cases constituting a continuous record unbroken or marred only by slight gaps down to the later-19th century or in some cases to the present time. Outstanding are the series of annual accounts from 1394, in roll form to 1556 with some losses, and complete in books from 1556; the virtually unbroken series of registers of leases and other instruments under the College seal; the court rolls of the College manors, kept separately in rolls for each manor down to 1556 and together in books forming an unbroken series thenceforward to the recent extinction of the manorial system; the estate accounts down to 1551 and in many cases (like the court rolls) extending back to dates long before the founding of the College and its acquisitions of the relevant properties; and the complete series of registers of Scholars and Fellows.

The modern archives of the College continue some of the earlier series: the minute books of the Governing Body and of the Estates and Finance Committee succeed to minutes of the meetings of the Warden and Fellows running from 1764; registers of Commoners form a series continuous from 1836; and the modern register of Choristers begun in 1904 succeeds to a broken series complete from 1772 to 1832 and again from 1890. To the ancient series of Bursars' annual accounts succeed the cash books and ledgers kept under the new system from 1874, while letter-books, rentals, and yearly vouchers are complete from 1878, together with extensive classes of correspondence and business papers concerned with the management of the estates of the College.

From the first the muniments were kept in the Treasury, a vaulted room above the vaulted Chapel Vestry, and accessible only from the spiral staircase leading to the roof. Above the Treasury (now Muniment Room) is a second room (Upper Muniment Room) beneath the oak-timbered and lead-covered roof: in this documents of secondary importance have long been preserved. Security, not

only for the muniments, but more especially in former times for the plate and ready cash of the Society, was ensured by the fact that down to the late-19th century the only access to the Vestry and staircase, and by their means to the Treasury, was through the Chapel, involving any marauder in the penalties of sacrilege. Thick masonry walls and vaults and heavy oak doors guard against fire (and in fact saved the Muniment Rooms from the great fire of 1815 in the adjacent First Chambers), while windows in the east and west walls provide constant ventilation, avoiding excess humidity.

Under the Founder's Statutes, responsibility for the custody of the muniments was placed upon the whole collegiate body, but more especially upon the Warden and upon those of the adult Fellows who, in their turns, fulfilled the offices of Sub-Warden and Bursars. Two Bursars were appointed yearly, and it was common for the junior Bursar of one year to be senior Bursar the next. As time went on, Fellows who showed special competence sometimes held office for several years in succession, but no full-time professional Bursar was appointed until 1877, under the new Governing Body. The sound state of preservation of most of the documents, and the relatively few losses, are undoubtedly due in the first place to the foresight and skill with which William of Wykeham drew up his Statutes, and to the strictness with which they were observed for five centuries. 8

The more important documents, including the sealed copies of the Statutes, have always been preserved in the two original common chests,9 of oak sheathed with iron, and provided with three locks. The doors of the Muniment Rooms had each two locks. Since the keys were held by different Fellows, of whom three had to be brought together to open a chest, risks were reduced to a minimum. No provision was made under the Statutes for any person to be specially charged with the preparation or the custody of documents, and the Bursars' accounts seem most commonly to have been written by the hand of one of the Fellows concerned, rather than by a clerk. The court rolls and other manorial records were, however, kept by the Steward of the College Manors, an officer appointed under heavy recognizances, while the registers of Scholars and Fellows and of oaths, and the earliest of the registers of documents under College seal, were kept by a notary, or by clerks employed in the Exchequer (i.e. the mediaeval Bursary).

The first of the College Notaries was Robert Heete, ¹⁰ born at Woodstock about 1390, a Winchester Scholar in 1401, and Fellow from 13 February 1421/22 to his death on 27 February 1432/33. From 1423 until his death he received 6s. 8d. a year as College Notary. Heete was a distinguished canonist and civilian and author of the best contemporary life of Wykeham, Libellus. . .de prosapia,

vita, et gestis. . . Willelmi di Wykeham, 1424. ¹¹ While a Fellow of the College he prepared from original sources the register of Scholars, which has been kept up as a contemporary record since 1425; he also compiled much of the early contents of the Liber Albus, a register of instruments under College seal, with a list of Fellows,

and inventories of College property and books.12

Methods initiated by Warden John Morys (Warden 1394-1413), and by the earliest Bursars in the Founder's own lifetime, were scrupulously adhered to for 150 years. The first noteworthy change is the cessation of the series of hall books after 1520, when the full record of names of persons taking meals in College Hall was abandoned.13 A much greater innovation took place at the election of Warden Thomas Stempe (1523-1581) in 1556. Until that year the Bursars' annual accounts were kept in roll form, and the court rolls likewise, as separate rolls for each manor. But from the year 1556-57 both accounts and manorial records were made in book form, the courts held for all College manors being entered chronologically in the same book.14 The yearly revenue accounts of the issues of each estate, which had until 1551 been kept as separate rolls, were also bound into the court books for more than a century. The mid-16th century saw also the compilation of the main College cartularies of copies of title deeds, the Registrum Rubrum and the two volumes of Evidentiae. 15

Apart from the adoption of book form and the abolition of individual estate accounts and court rolls, there was little change in the way in which the records were kept. Roman numerals slowly gave place to Arabic, but down to 1865 the main headings under which the College accounts were kept remained the same as they had been in 1394. After 1556, however, there was a tendency to be more economical of words, giving entries in a less detailed form. It is clear that a sense of the value of time spent in writing and in consultation of records is marked by the major changes of 1556, and that Stempe as head of the Society must be regarded as their author. 16

Use of the College records for historical research is evidenced from early in the 15th century, ¹⁷ though legal purposes remained until the 19th century a far more common reason for consultation. The change to book form and the provision of indexes to the court books and lease registers were necessary steps to make readily available the rapidly growing body of record and precedent in the conduct of College affairs. The drawing up of detailed manuals of procedure in manuscript was a further stage reached c, 1800 and exemplified by a 'Steward's Handbook' ¹⁸ for the holding of courts at College manors, and 'The Bursar's Assistant', ¹⁹ an explanation of the College methods of accountancy.

Systematic exploration of the documents with other than legal ends in view began in the 18th century. Robert Lowth (1710-87), in his model Life of William of Wykeham (1758), printed a number of documents from College sources, and had made substantial use of the early registers at least, Charles Blackstone (1719-1804), Fellow of the College from 1748 to 1783 and again from 1788 to his death, elder brother of the famous author of Commentaries on the Laws of England, examined the series of Bursars' rolls and a considerable number of other documents over a period of many years, and produced in manuscript a large collection entitled 'Benefactors of Winchester College' completed in 1784,20 really a history of the estates, buildings, and ornaments of the foundation derived mainly, though not exclusively, from its own archives, and admirably indexed. Though giving references to documents used, Blackstone's manuscript is in no sense a catalogue of those which existed in his day.

Apart from the cartularies, 21 and various early lists compiled for specific purposes, nothing resembling a catalogue was prepared until after 1840, when the work was undertaken by the Revd. William Henry Gunner (1812-59), appointed one of the College Chaplains in 1839.22 Gunner confined his attention to the title deeds and miscellaneous documents contained in the sets of drawers in Muniment Room, listing each estate by itself, and giving the contents of each drawer a serial numbering. Each drawer was provided with a list of its contents, while the whole series was transcribed as a catalogue in five volumes.23 Though incomplete, Gunner's catalogue was a notable pioneer achievement, and he avoided unnecessary interference with the order in which he found the material. By publication of excerpts from the archives in contributions to the Archaeological Journal between 1851 and 1858, Gunner also stimulated the interest of historians and antiquaries.24

Regrettably, Gunner's completed catalogue was mislaid for over fifty years; Thomas Frederick Kirby (1836-1910), after he had been appointed as full-time professional Bursar in 1877, 25 undertook an entirely fresh catalogue of the material already dealt with by Gunner, and produced a more detailed and complete list, extending to 1,900 quarto pages. 26 Kirby extensively re-arranged the documents and renumbered them, so that comparison between his catalogue and that of Gunner is difficult. In the light of more recent work, however, it does not appear that significant losses of listed items took

place between 1850 and 1900.

Both custody and use of the archives were modernised under Herbert Chitty (1863-1949), Kirby's successor as Bursar (1911-27) and as Steward of the College Manors (1911-49).²⁷ After retirement

from the bursarship in 1927 Chitty was appointed Keeper of the College Archives and was particularly active in preparing a card catalogue of all manorial records, of which a duplicate copy was deposited with the Secretary of the Manorial Committee at the Public Record Office. This added to Kirby's catalogue of title deeds a complete list of all court rolls, surveys, and manorial and estate accounts. Some documents were repaired at the Public Record Office, and most of the ancient muniments boxed and clearly labelled. The College records under Chitty became widely known as a historical source of prime importance and were used extensively by, among others, the Committee on Price History and the English Place-Name Society. By means of numerous contributions to periodicals, notably to The Wykehamist and to Notes and Queries, and by supplying material to the authors of works of Wykehamical, local, and artistic history, Chitty placed the history of the foundation itself, and the use of its documents, upon an entirely new footing.

In 1937 Austin E. A. W. Smyth (1877-1949) was appointed Deputy Keeper of the College Archives, ²⁸ and besides assisting Chitty undertook the task of making a more scientific list of all title deeds, to replace the unsatisfactory catalogue of Kirby. The new list was prepared in great detail in accordance with the methods laid down by the British Records Association, and was provided with full indexes to all personal and place-names. Of some sixty College estates, the deeds of seventeen had been fully described in this way before Smyth's death, while he had also made complete transcripts of most deeds, and of many other documents, concerning

each of these seventeen estates.

After the end of the war of 1939-45 it became evident that the historical study of archives was entering on a new phase, and that so important a body of records as those of Winchester College, to be reasonably accessible, required a complete descriptive list incorporating the various partial sources of information already in existence. Chitty therefore planned a comprehensive catalogue, which though accepting the fundamental arrangement by estates, as reorganised by Kirby, should incorporate the whole of the documents.

The basis of arrangement is then the traditional grouping, as codified by Gunner and by Kirby, with additions made by Chitty and by Smyth, and further enlarged. The muniments as a whole are notionally divided into two main sections: (I) College: (II) Estates. The first section includes classes of royal and other charters, documents concerning the site of the College and its properties in Winchester, those relating to Fromond's Chantry within the College, and those acquired in 1544 with the adjacent site of St. Elizabeth's

College. Artificial groups had long ago been formed of miscellaneous documents of general administration (*Domus* I and II) and these were to be extended to cover such series as the various registers, the Bursars' account rolls, the court books, and the minute books of the Warden and Fellows.

The muniments are numbered in a single series, arranged section by section in the order of Kirby's manuscript catalogue, but adding to each estate the relevant classes of court rolls and other manorial records, stray miscellanea, and ministers' accounts. New classes (maps and surveys; *Domus* III and IV, designed to include the main series of administrative documents; and miscellanea such as correspondence, respectively) were added, bringing the total of items dealt with to some 25,000. Beyond no. 24919 a new classification,

'Continuatio', begins.

Apart from a small amount of experimental work, progress on the new catalogue was postponed by financial considerations until 1957, when generous aid from the Pilgrim Trust made it possible for the Warden and Fellows to sanction the appointment of a temporary assistant archivist for a period of two years, for the purpose of compiling a descriptive list on cards on these principles. A numerical register of all documents, with concordance of earlier numberings, was also made, every document was stamped as well as numbered, and items in need of repair separately listed. Seals and

their condition are mentioned, but not described.29

The work was carried out between September 1957 and December 1959 by Miss Sheila J. Elliott (now Mrs. Frank Himsworth), under the general direction of the College Archivist. What was then completed includes virtually the whole of the muniments earlier in date than 1873, while in a second campaign of work in 1964 Mrs. Himsworth added descriptions of the cancelled and counterpart leases of College leaseholds. These supplement the registered copies contained in the lease books. Manorial documents have been included down to the end of the manorial system, and in other cases material of recent date has been listed where it seemed desirable to keep together a complete chain of records.

Within the compass of a brief introduction it is impossible to indicate with any approach to adequacy the contents of some 30,000 documents covering a thousand years, many of the items consisting of lengthy rolls and books. Nor is it easy to single out items of particular importance and spectacular quality. The Anglo-Saxon charters come first chronologically, though not directly related to the College; but they are perhaps surpassed in interest by the series of Royal charters and licences, and autograph letters from a number of Sovereigns, largely concerned with the nomination of Scholars to what was for long regarded as a quasi-royal

foundation, so extensive were the privileges granted by Richard II. Art is represented by various decorations and by maps and plans. Among the latter is a bird's-eye survey of c. 1536 (WCM 3233) showing land at Newnham, Hants., one of the earliest of English watercolours. Unexpected references to public affairs occur in business correspondence and elsewhere: to the Battle of Agincourt (22097), to the troubled affairs of 16th-century Europe (2245, 4384), to the Civil War (15308, 22649), and to the Dutch War and the Great Plague of 1665 (19644, 23241). It is surprising to find among title deeds a private letter of c. 1172 (2790), and it has seemed worth drawing attention to records of Coroner's inquests (18309-310), to illuminations and to re-used fragments of manuscript, to music, and to documents referring to accommodation provided for the aged in former times (8166, 10283, 16658).

Special thanks are due to Mrs. Himsworth for much work done in her own time and for an enthusiastic interest which far transcended the terms of her employment; and to Mr. Denis Lee of the College Bursary, whose phenomenal memory for all matters concerned with College and Estates administration was of the

greatest assistance throughout the preparation of the list.

APPENDIX

Among the injunctions noted in WCM 67 of 1404-05, the following relate to the muniments of the College:

Item quod munimenta de singulis manerijs per se ponantur in

cophinis cum suis titulis superscriptis.

Item quod fiant cophine sufficientes pro eisdem.

Item de Indenturis faciendis inter Custodem et Collegium de bonis Collegij remanentibus in manibus eiusdem Custodis ad vsum Officij sui.

Item de Indenturis de bonis et ornamentis Capelle liberatis sacriste

perficiendis et liberandis.

Item de Indenturis faciendis de vtensilibus liberatis officiarijs panetrie Botellerie Coquine Pistrini Stabuli Gardini et Barbitons'.

It might be thought that the fifth and sixth memoranda indicated that there had been neglect of the proper preservation of documents, but in fact the Bursars' Account for 1399-1400 (WCM 22085) contains a payment of 5s. to William Ikenham the well-known College carpenter, for making a desk to stand in the midst of the choir of the Chapel, 'et pro diuersis coffynis pro munimentis conseruandis in Thesauro'.

The seals are very numerous and important, and a full catalogue remains a desideratum. Many of those of outstanding interest were cast in gutta-percha c. 1850 by Mr. Ready of the British Museum at the instance of Gunner. A set of these casts is preserved at the College (Warden's Lodgings) with Gunner's list of the seals cast; a second set is incorporated in the classified collection of seal-casts preserved by the Society of Antiquaries of London.

EDITORIAL INTRODUCTION

Winchester College Muniments are numbered in a single series, and the Descriptive List follows the arrangement under 'College' and 'Estates' used by T. F. Kirby. For the purposes of publication, however, it has in some cases been regrouped to allow related sections to appear in the same volume; the numbering, therefore, is not always consecutive. For example Volume I contains all the sections relating to College; Domus III, Vouchers, and Domus IV having been placed next to Domus II although listed much later as their numbering shows; similarly the New College Additions follow New College. The 'Continuatio' section is followed by a group of 'Collected Items', which is distinct from the Collected Items within Domus IV, and has its own system of numbering.

The College Leases were originally listed together in alphabetical order of estates after the 'Estates', but have now been split up and placed at the end of the estate to which they relate. At the end of 'Continuatio' and before the first lease there is a gap of six numbers.

These do not relate to any documents.

In a number of places reference is made to fuller descriptions in the series of foolscap volumes prepared by the National Register of Archives which reproduced the original cards by a xerographic process. Sets of these can be found in the British Museum; the Bodleian Library, Oxford; Cambridge University Library; the John Rylands Library, Manchester; the National Library of Wales, Aberystwyth; and the Institute of Historical Research, University of London; the County Record Offices of Berkshire, Dorset, Hampshire, Middlesex, Somerset, Surrey and Wiltshire; the Guildhall Library, London; the London Library; the Society of Antiquaries of London; New College, Oxford, and the Universities of Bristol and Southampton. There is also a set in the Library of Congress, Washington, D.C.

In listing long series of Account Rolls, where one roll normally covers one year, blocks of numbers have been used with outside dates only, and the year gaps indicated e.g. Bursars' Rolls 22082-22212. This method has also been used with books where one book normally covers one year and the year gaps and exceptions indicated e.g. Rough Ledgers 22654-22700. For other series of books e.g. Bursars' Books 22213-22233, and Hall Books 22812-22871 etc., outside dates for each volume have been given. In the case of the

Audit Books 22704-22766, with the exception of the first three which cover one year each, each book contains two years down to 1754, and outside dates only have been given. From 1755 onwards the dates for each volume are given. Blocks of numbers have also been given wherever the description remains the same for a number of documents, and in such cases outside dates only are given.

Place-names are given in modern spelling except where there is any doubt when the spelling of the document is given in quotes with the suggested modern equivalent, if any, in brackets with a query. The exception to this rule is Verham Dean, where the spelling Fernhamsdean is used. In the case of known persons the modern forms of their names are used, others are spelt as in the documents even where variations occur in the same name. Dates from 1 January to 24 March inclusive in documents earlier than 1752 are here assigned to the historical year; in cases where uncertainty might arise the double dating (e.g. 1603/4) is added. In the case of copies the date at the beginning of the description refers to the original and not to the copy, except where indicated.

The many transcripts, manuscript notes and much correspondence relating to the muniments have not been mentioned in the text but detailed references to them appear in the NRA List, and all are preserved at the College with the Deed cards of A. Smyth. There is also in the College Library a number of special printed items not easily obtainable elsewhere; a list of the main items of which is given on p. xxxii. A conversion table for Kirby's numbers

is at pp. xxv-xxxi.

Scholars are identified by the year of their election taken from Kirby's 'Winchester Scholars'. Many were not in fact admitted

until the year following their election.

Up to and including 1700 languages other than Latin and material other than parchment are indicated, thereafter languages other than English and material other than paper are indicated. No square brackets have been used, and full points are omitted where not essential. Additional information is preceded by the word Note, or placed in brackets.

The Index, which relates to the full Descriptive List and not only to the present version, was made by Mrs. Virginia Clanchy

and Peter Gwyn, the College Archivist.

For information on the manuscripts reused in binding some of the volumes in Domus III thanks are due to Mr. A. J. Collins and Mr. Neil Ker. Thanks are also due to John Harvey, Peter Gwyn and Mrs. Clanchy for much help with editing the List, and to Mrs. Leonora Clarke for help with proof reading.

Note. In Register entry of 1569 concerning Richard Fiennes (p.78) is now marked, in the handwriting of Charles Blackstone, 'Vide A.D. 1586', and the original of the above document is entered in Register (pp. 97,98) immediately before the entries relating to Scholars adm under Election of 1586. The entry of 1569 was in fact made by Thomas Larke, Fellow 1560-82, who was at that time notary public to College (see Bursar's Accounts of 1568-69, under Feoda), and in that capacity wrote up Register. As notary he received annual fee of 6s 8d. For another fee of 6s 8d he wrote up the Bursar's Accounts (See Ibid.). Bp's decision was that an entry in Register, to be valid, had to agree with entry in Roll ad Winton. Entry of 1569 concerning Richard Fiennes ought therefore to have described him as Founder's Kin, without any statement about his pedigree.

It states that College Baker, Brewer and Cook, having families, dwell outside College but near to it, and within liberty of Leet and View of Frank-pledge of Bp of Winchester. They perform their duties within College. The homage of Leet have presented Baker to be Constable for Liberty, but he cannot act both as Constable and College Baker. Warden and Scholars crave for him exemption from office of Constable by virtue of Charter from Richard II, whereby they and their men and tenants are to be quit of toll and view of Frank-pledge. Eng. Paper. Note. Richardson was L.C.J. of K.B., 24 Oct 1631, until death on 5 Feb 1635. Denham was Baron of Exchequer 1617-39. Petition was addressed to them while at Winchester as Judges of Assize.

To the Q what money has been made from Timber belonging to the Coll since his Ldship's Translation into this his Diocese - We answer that being sworn to the Statutes and intrusted by the Founder with the College Muenny (? money) wee have amployed it according to that trust and hold ourselves obleig'd to give noe further account.
- 6. As to the Q whether there be anything in the Charter of either of the Colleges to exempt the Coll from the Visitation of their Ordinary, etc., We answer that the same power which hath constituted his Ldship Visitor of the College and exempted that College from the Ordinary, hath likewise appointed the Warden and Posers of N.C. our Visitors and thereby exempted us from our Ordinary.
- As concerning the Warden's not dining in the Hall, as far as we can understand, it hath been the practise of all the Wardens from Warden Bilson's time (who was the first marryed Warden) to the present day.'

At the foot of the paper is written - 'The fluttering vayn gallant in London consumes His Estates in Rich clothes and perfumes.' Note. 'Dr B.' in the answer to Q 1 was the Headmaster, he may have been Dr Burt (1653-8) or Dr Beeston (1658-79) or Dr Burton (1724-66); but the style and spelling of the document seem to be of the 17th century and not the 18th.
