## Introduction

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Introduction

In its original endowment the College was granted a farm and rent of 701:1s from John Styward, Knight, for the custody of the alien Manors of East Wretham and Bledlow which he held on lease for seven years from Michaelmas 1438; with the reversion of the same when it should befal. The Manor of East Wretham had been given to the abbey of Bec by Ralph de Toeni who appears as the holder in the Domesday Survey . Blomefield quotes from a customary of the manor, taken from the register of the abbey, and suggests that an Etonian custom may derive therefrom "When the harvest work was finished by the tenants, they were to have half an acre of barley, and a ram let loose in the midst of them; and if they catched him, he was their own to make merry with, but if he escaped from them, he was the lord's, which custom is still kept at Eton College, there being a ram every year let loose among the scholars, on a certain day, to be run down by them, the original of which might come from the custom of this Manor." "Sports." says Maxwell Lyte. " which would now be considered reprehensible were tolerated, and even encouraged, at Eton, in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. For instance, the College butcher had to provide a ram annually at Electiontide, to be hunted and killed by the scholars. We first hear of this barbarous pastime in 1687, when a 'ram-club' appears in the bill of extras for a boy named Patrick. Edward Wood wrote thus to his father on the 21st of July of that year:-

This is to acquaent you that the electione, being near att hand, which is our usuall vacation from business and, with your leave, a time appointed for home enjoyments, and prosuming upon an old custome that you will be pleased to grant this, I further request you to send the horses for us, that they may be here to-morrow about noon, which will

'will make our journey far more pleasant, and at the least give us the satisfaction of seeing the ram die here, as is according to custome.'

The customary of the Manor of East Wretham has recently been printed. The barbarous custom of chasing the ram is described as follows:- Tempore falcature habebunt unum multonem qui circumdatus ab eis si evaserit remanebit domino.

Blomefield can hardly be mentioned here without memories of another East Anglian antiquary, his contemporary and boon companion, Tom Martin of Palgrave, styled, by himself, "honest", and, in the Dictionary of National Biography . as "this unscrupulous topographer"; the first, and, until the present time, the last person to attempt to make a comprehensive catalogue of the archives at Eton College. It is to Martin that we owe our knowledge of Blomefield's appearance. At the beginning of the first volume of the octavo edition of the History of Norfolk (1805) there is an engraving of a cleric, purporting to be Blomefield, which bears this note: "Copied from an old print, originally engraved as the portrait of another person, but preserved, and highly valued, by the late Mr. Thomas Martin, as a striking likeness of the Norfolk Topographer". The original likeness was apparently of John Flamsteed, the astronomer. The face of "honest Tom" Martin's croney, as one would expect, is not an ascetic one.

The records at Eton contain various bailiffs! and reeves! accounts for the 14<sup>th</sup> century (nos. 43-48), but are otherwise disappointing for the period of the alien priory. For the period of the College ownership there is an abnormal amount of correspondence, due, in large measure, to one particularly unsatisfactory tenant, Mr. Colhoun, at the end of the 18<sup>th</sup> century.

A sentence in a lease of 1515 (no. 2) is a reminder of the College's lost London property. The rent for East Wretham was to be paid, says the lease, either at the College or at the Hospital of St. James.

Introduction

The documents catalogued in this volume continue the series of deeds relating to property in Eton. Some thirty of these are of the period before the foundation of the College. They include (381) the sale of a serf for two silver marks.

Not all the records here relate to the transfer of land.

Among the earliest documents concerning the College are two grants of fairs in 1443 (413) and 1445 (415). The purpose of the second of these grants appears to have been to allow the College to make use of any part of the town they might choose for the fair, in addition to the perhaps rather remote "Mychelmylwardeshey", located by Maxwell Lyte at the further end of the playing fields. It also contains a provision safeguarding neighbouring fairs.

A fifteenth century customary (432) has been included in this series.

The earliest College lease is that of Jourdelay's Place, dated 1510 (434), and most of the records here are leases by the Provost and Fellows of various tenements in Eton from about the middle of the sixteenth to about the middle of the seventeenth century. So far as it could be done with confidence, the leases relating to the several properties have been brought together. The lessees range from fellows and headmasters to a College organist and a King's trumpeter, from the clerk of the bursars and a College singing-man to tailors, barbers, butlers, joiners, shoemakers, brewers, maltsters, butchers, cooks and fishermen. There is for the most part little variation in the rents during this period, though in some cases there was an augmentation of two fat capons at Christmas. This increase appears for the first time at the end of 1624 (547). Was it perhaps imposed at the suggestion of the newly elected provost, Wotton? The presence of the latter at any rate seems to show itself in the names of certain of

the witnesses. Who, for example, can Christofano Pallady (462) have been, if not some Italian friend of Wotton? But the most interesting witness to appear on these leases is undoubtedly Andrew Marvell (484, 515). His two signatures were the subject of a letter to the <u>Times Literary Supplement</u> on 8 February 1952, as follows:

Andrew Marvell has proved a coy subject for biographical research. Of the later Marvell, the politician and public man, it is true, we know, surely, as much as we want. Of young Marvell, the lyric poet, we know all too little. "A more elusive, non-recorded character," says his biographer, "is hardly to be found." How many of those epistles to the burgesses of Hull would we not give for one early letter from abroad or any revealing scraps of documentation from the "green" period? At about the end of that period he was at Eton, tutoring Cromwell's ward, William Dutton, in the house of John Oxenbridge, fellow of the College. It is from his friend, Oxenbridge, formerly an exiled Puritan minister, that he is presumed to have learned what he knew about the remote Bermudas. Two signatures of Marvell have recently come to light at Eton which, if they do nothing more, at least take us into the presence of the poet and of Oxenbridge on August 3, 1654. On that day two leases of College houses at Eton were authenticated, one to William Barnsby, brewer, and the other to Oxenbridge himself. Both were signed, sealed and delivered in the presence of Andrew Marvell.
