Introduction

Records, vol. 7, and includes a number of mediaeval documents. Among these is a fourteenth century copy of the custumal which was printed in 1951 from a MS. in the British Museum. Our copy (no. 5) supplies a few passages that are missing where the Additional MS. is damaged. And the gaps in Hugh de Gournay's charter (vol. 7 no. 2) are filled from the citation of that charter in the Assize Rell of which an extract is here described (no. 500). The end of perhaps the most venerable series of court rells in England takes place with no. 127 of this catalogue.

The busy operation of the manorial system in its later phases is illustrated by the great number of eighteenth and nineteenth century admissions, surrenders, deputations, warrants to enter satisfaction etc., which survive for Eledlow. Though the information contained in these documents should almost always appear on the court relis, which I do not, by reason of their bulk, attempt to transcribe or analyse, I have yet seen fit to describe each one here, as they are formal and authenticated deeds. I have also given copious extracts from the vigorous and entertaining letters of Hr.

J.J. Harper, the College bailiff in the early part of the nineteenth century.

When the records that are described in this volume are added to those in the previous catalogue, it will be found that Bledlow is perhaps the best documented of all the College estates.

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Deeds (1 - 4) Indenture of lease for 12 years by Ralph Carbonel and Maud, his wife, to William de Guinevill, proctor of the abbey of Bec in England, of all the land they hold from the abbey in Bledlow from Lady day 1241. The grantee has paid 7 marks silver.

Indented bill, 27 January 1536, witnessing that Robert
Welles, bursar of Eton College has sold to John Coper, of Tame,
a certain platt of wood being 7 acres broad at one end and
4 acres broad at the other. The said John must leave all the
standers that are at 24 inches and under above the ground,
which standers are counted at 1100, and is to hedge and pale
this platt, which lies in a wood called Schynnolds in Eledlow,
at his own expense. The platt, which is counted by the said
Welles and Laurence Smyth and John Stevyns at 33 acres in length,
is estimated in all at 15 acres. John to pay 50 marks for the
platt and to maintain the pale between the standing wood and the
new coppice for 7 years. Also he must have away his wood
within a year and three quarters and make the pale before Lady
day next.

Indenture of sale, 2 December 1581, by the Provost and College to Edmund Waller, of Colshill, co. Herts., gent., for a competent sum of money, of all their woods and underwoods on the manor of Bledlow for 21 years. No trees, however, to be cut down under the scantling of 16 inches, to be measured three feet above the stem, except in such coppices as the grantee shall during the said term have fenced and hedged in for springs.

printed in Select Documents of the English lands of the abbey of Bee, edited by Marjorie Chibnall (Camden Third Series, vol. LXXIII pp. 119-123, 1951), where the text is taken from MS. Add. 24316. This document is dated not later than 1248. The manuscript at Eton is in a hand of the latter half of the fourteenth century. It supplies certain deficiencies where the earlier document is damaged and there are a few points of difference. The material points to be noted are as follows:-

The document at Eton consists of a roll of two membranes, of which the following is a translation:

Customs of the Manor of Bledelawe

William Ketelbern holds half a hidate of land for 9s. a year, payable half at Martinmas, half at St. John the Baptist. And he has to plough 2 acres at the winter sowing and harrow Item he owes at the them and pay a 1d at the threshing same sowing if he has a whole plough team to plough 1 acre, and if a half he shall plough & acre, and if he does not have that he shall plough according to what he has to the plough, and if he has nothing he shall plough nothing. Similarly at the Lent sowing he shall plough I acre in the same way as said above concerning the other winter acre. And in the same way he shall plough another acre at fallow in summer. The terms within which these 3 acres are to be ploughed are Martinmas the first acre, Lady day the second and St. John the Baptist the third. Item he has to hoe with 1 man for 1 day without food. Item he has to now for 6 days with 2 scythes and each day he shall have as much grass as he can lift with the handle of a scythe, and he must clear the hay from the field he cuts, and for this he shall have the common aid of the cottars each of whom has to clear 3 mowings in 18 acres and the mowers the residue. he must carry the lord's hay together with the others until it shall all be carried with the help of the lord's carts. he has to reap at the 3 boon works of the lord in autumn at his own cost with his whole household except his own person and his

wife and his shepherd, and if he has no serving man he must reap himself or find a man in his place. Item at the fourth boon work he must in the same way reap but this must be at the cost of the lord, to wit for one hour and if the lord wishes to have several boonworks this shall be of grace at the cost of the lord. Item if the lord's wood shall bear, he must pay pannage for his pigs like any other alien. Item when the lord's hay and corn have been carried he is to have common with his sheep until Lady day. And from that term the lord shall have the pasture called Northorn and that called Done free, so that nobody can enter them without licence till the feast of St. Peter ad Vincula except the parson of the church of Bledelaws and Henry de Turry who shall have his oxen with the lord's on Northorn and his other cattle on Done, similarly, except 3 carters and the Hayward each of whom shall have I cow and 1 bullock there. Item he may not give his daughter without the licence of the lord and on his decease the lord shall have his best beast. And if he die intestate all his goods shall remain at the disposition of the lord. Item he has to pay sect and lot at all gifts and aids.

Osbert son of Peter, above which is written Henry ate Mede, holds & virgate for 2s payable at the said terms. Item he has at the winter sowing to plough 1 acre and harrow it and give &d at the threshing. Item he has to mow for 6 days with 1 scythe, and in all other services and customs he is the same as William Ketelberne.

Henry de Cruce holds a virgate for 55 payable at the said terms, and in all else he is like the said Osbert. Item he holds a grove called Stubelgrava for 12d.

The

Portaverit, i.e. shall bear mast or acorns for the pigs;
 or, perhaps, shall bear, that is, sustain, the pigs.

The relict of Adam atte Strete, above which is written Cristina ate Strete, holds a virgate for 5s.

Ralph, above which is written John, Andreu helds a virgate for 5s.

Richard Albus holds a virgate for 6s. And the following each hold a virgate: Henry Cutelbern for 4s;

Alexander de Dene for 8s; Adam de Dene for 7s; Hugh de Frihitts for 3s; John Hardyng for 4s:2d; the relict of Ysaac for 10s; Richard de Dene for 8s; the relict of Reginald Palmere and Hugh for 5s and if they have more than two pigs and the wood shall bear, the lord shall have the third best pig and they shall be quit of pannage; Simon Fraunceys for 10s; Hugh Wykyng for 10s:4d. All these are like Osbert in all other customs and services.

John de la Dene holds a virgate for 55 and is like in all else except that he will not plough Beneacre.

Hugh Frauncleyn holds a virgate for 3s and in all else he is like the said John.

The relict of Richard Mathew holds & virgate for 35:6d and in all else is like the said John according to what pertains to & virgate.

The relict of Sperlyng holds a virgate for & mark and if she has a plough must plough 3 acres a year viz. at the winter sowing 1 acre and at the Lent sowing 1 acre and at the fallow in summer 1 acre. And if she does not have a whole plough she shall plough according to what she has and must lift 3 mowings of hay and carry and hoe and reap and pay pannage like William Ketulbern. Like the said William also in the marrying of a

daughter, giving a beast after death, making a will and scot and lot.

Hugh Durewyne holds a virgate for 3g and in all else is like the relict of Sperling.

John son of Peter holds a virgate for 12d and in all else is like the widow Sperling except that he will pay pannage like the said Reginalda Palmer.

John Gubbel holds a virgate for 125:6d. In all else like the widow Sperling.

Peter Coterel holds a virgate for 5g. In all else like the widow Sperlyng.

John Senholt holds a virgate for 2g. In all else like the widow Sperlyng except that he will not hoe nor have hay.

William de Hulle holds & virgate for 3g and according to what he has to the plough he will plough and pay pannage like the others. Item he must lift 3 mowings of hay and help stacking the hay and hoe for one day without food and reap in autumn like the others. Item if the lord wishes he shall be a ploughman or shepherd and then shall be quit of 3g and of carrying letters.

Walter de Hulle holds à virgate with a certain increase for 4s.

Beatrice relict of Denis holds & virgate for 3g.

Henry Lockesbury holds a virgete for 6s and will do all the services and customs that William Ketelbern will do.

William son of Walter Mathew holds a virgate and more, with a messuage and will pay 175:4d. Otherwise the same as the said Ketelbern.

Robert Costard holds & virgate for 3s.

John son of Hugh holds & virgate for 3g. In all else like William atte Hulle.

Robert son of Alwy holds & virgate for 3s and a croft for 18d and will do double works unlike John son of Hugh and if he shall be a ploughman there will be no relaxation of the 18d.

Hugh Faber holds & virgate for 3g and in all works is like
John son of Hugh and because he makes the iron work of two
ploughs the said 3g are released to him. And he used to have
a tree for charcoal by delivery of the bailiff. The presentors
of the customs say that the said holders of half virgates have
to drive and carry letters.

John Squier holds 4 acres and a mill for 5g and in all other customs is like William de Hull except that he does not have to stack hay nor be a carter or carry letters or drive.

William de More holds & virgate for 2s and in all else is like William de Hulle except that he will not be a carter.

Hugh Fraunceys holds a croft for 13d and in all else is like the said William except for the plough.

Gilbert son of Mabel holds a messuage for 18d and in all other works is like Hugh Fraunceys.

John Cartar holds 2 acres for 12d and is otherwise like Hugh Fraunceys.

Henry de Fryth holds à virgate for 25:4d and is otherwise like Hugh Fraunceys.

Walter Mareschall holds & virgate with a percel of meadow for 18d and is otherwise like the widow Sperling except that he has to give a pig for pannage like the said Reginalda Falmere and to be forester and then he will be quit of 12d and of works except the great boon-works.

William de Strate holds 2 acres for 25 and otherwise is like Hugh Fraunceis.

William Follers, John Follers and Guymota, relict of Varin tenants of Christian Junior have to plough according to what they have to the plough and to hoe for one day without food and lift 5 mowings of hay in 18 acres and at the first boonworks to reap without food and at the great boon-work like the others with one man.

Hugh son of Walter, Agnes Pynel, Maud relict of Geoffrey,
Hugh Herlewyne, Robert Carpunter, Waldyng, Peter Niger, Andrew
Haket, Lettice relict of Coterel, tenants of the parson, have
to do the same services as the said William and John Follere do.

Osbert de Lucre, William Quant, tenants of the same parson, remain subject to claim because newly enfeoffed.

John Coky, tenant of Senhelt, has to do similarly as the tenants of the said Christian.

Hugh de Capella holds a curtilage and a croft for 18d and has to work like the tenants of the said Christian and also to stack hay. And all under-tenants of the whole manor owe the same services as the men of the said Christian.

Free Tenants

Henry Turry holds land called Dodegrave for & pound of pepper and owes suit at all courts, and all his tenants who are in assize have to do suit at the courts of Martinmas and Hockeday at every view of frankpledge, and all of twelve years and more have to be placed on the assise in the lord's court and make oath and pay the thyngpeny and commute the fine with the tenants and then the lord is to receive a fourth part [? four parts] and the said Henry a fifth part. Also he and his successors sust swear fealty to the new proctors of Bec and do homage to the abbots. Item he must find at his own expense one man before the Justices Itinerant and three at the expense of the lord, and for the defence of the liberty and of other rights of which Henry is a participant he must find proportionate expenses. Item half a hidate which was of Constantine answers for 17g a year and the tenants there owe relief and pannage and on the creation of a new abbot he must give an aid and at the renewal of the charter of liberty the same and make suit and at the view of frankpledge pay scot along with others. And the said tenants may not and must not admit or receive any newcomer within the fee without the licence of the lords. These are the names of the said tenants: Alice de Colleshull, Ralph de la Pole, John Bridel and Richard God. And their under-tenants must reap at the great boon-work.

William son of John Fraunceys holds a messuage for 12d and owes suit of court and pannage. Item there is a chapel on the fee of the lords and the parishioners will pay for a certain croft belonging to the chapel 6d.

Simon Druel, over which is written now Hampden, holds a certain grove for 7d at the Nativity of St. John the Baptist and owes suit of court and must de fealty and homage like the said Henry. Item a virgate which was of Hugh de Senholt and

the land which is called Hermite pays yearly 63:6d and at death a horse with harness and pannage like the relict of Reginald Palmere.

John Peet holds 3 parts of a virgate for 12d and has to pay pannage and sect and lot and at his death the lord shall have his best beast for heriot.

William de Grenemyle holds 3 virgates for lls:6d and must plough, mow, lift, carry and reap in autumn as William Ketelbern except that he shall not plough Beneacre and at his death the lord shall have the best beast for heriot and he must pay pannage like the relict of Reginald Palmere, and pay scot and lot.

The parson of the church shall pay yearly 7g for 2 virgate upon which are situated his barn and the house of Andrew Haked and he owes pannage like William Grenemyle, to wit the third best pig and for this he shall have his pigs fed in Eledelowe quit, otherwise not, and he shall have in the lord's wood by delivery husbote and heybote.

Item the following pay for purpresture, John Sperlyng ld, Henry de Fryht 4d, Alice de Colleshulle 2d, Agnes Fraunceys 2dd, William Derwyne 3d, Simon Albus 2d, Adam sen of Wyburg 6d, Hugh Wykyng 6d, William Dyrie 3d, and out of this sum the said Henry is to receive the fifth penny.

Tythes belonging to the keepership of the manor: from Wycombe, Estona, Henton, Wodesdon, Astropd and Quenton, the tenants being Robert Bet, John Grey and William Motte.

Item, Geoffrey Dubbel has sold by his charter to the church of Bec whatever he had or could have had in Bledelowe except acre with a messuage, to wit from John Sperlyng a rent of 3s for 12 acres.

Item, from Walter Juvene for 32 acres 12d, and from Alan de Standens 6d for a messuage with 22 acres.

Item, from Henry de Frith 1d for a small grove.

The tenants further more will answer to the abbot of Bec immediately and the abbot will answer to the chief lords for the rents pertaining to them, and all escheats that may take place on that fee will be the abbot's.

Item, the reeve while he is in the service of the lord will be quit of 5g rent if he pays so much end if he pays less the lord shall make good to him 5g a year and he is to be quit of all customs and services pertaining to a virgate. He shall have a tree in the lord's wood against Christmas by view of the bailiff. And his plough exen shall go on the demesne pasture along with the lord's exen. And if the reeve shall go upon the lord's business on his own horse he shall have hay for that day. And the reeve shall be at the lord's table or at his livery as the lord wills.

Item, the hayward shall be quit of yearly rent. He shall have his horse and one cow and one bullock in the lord's pasture and shall have a headland called Haydoneshaht and on the day of beconwork he shall have I sheef and on the last day he shall have a thrave of wheat. And he has to keep watch on the crops, meadows and pastures of the lord, and if they are damaged in any way he shall answer for the damage. Item he has to make all summonses.

Item the ploughman must be quit of yearly rent and shall have the lord's plough always for the second Saturday. And

on

on the day of the carrying of the carts, if he goes with one cart he shall have one sheaf and he shall have against Christmas firewood by delivery of the bailiff and he shall have in the lord's pasture 1 cow and 1 bullock. And he sust come in the early morning to the plough with the handle of the plough and hold it till noon and after dinner return to the hall and do whatever work the bailiff shall order him to do.

Item the forester shall be quit of 12d yearly and shall have against Christmas a tree by licence of the bailiff, and if the wood shall be damaged, he shall answer for the damage.

William Bardolf and Julian, his wife, versus the abbot of Bec, claiming the manor of Bledelawe with its appurtenances (except five messuages, a mill, two carucates of arable and the advowson of the church) as the right and heritage of Julian from her ancestor Hugh, in the time of King Richard, by way of Gerard, his son and heir, and them, as he died without progeny, by way of Hugh, his brother, the father of Julian. The defendant recognises the seisin of the first Hugh, as of fee and right, but says that Julian can claim no right in the premises, because the said Hugh gave them to the abbey of Bec, and he produces the charter of Hugh de Gornaco which is recited.

The plaintiffs say they have no need to answer to the said charter as it was made outside the Kingdom - dicunt quod in carta illa inseruntur quedam verba a quibus evidenter elici potest tam per tenorem carte quam per testes nominates quod confecta sunt extra regram Anglie scilicet in partibus transmarinis - and cannot be verified.

Postea. William pays 40g for licence to agree, and the agreement is that William and Julian release to the abbot their claim upon the manor, and the abbot agrees to pay them 200 marks, in four half-yearly instalments, at the priory of St. Mary of Southwark.

A farm of 131:6s:8d from the alien priory of Cogges, a cell of the abbey of Fecamp, was granted to the College of the original endowment of 25 March 1441. The grant was confirmed in 1462. No records of the Priory before the transfer of the property to the College have been found at Eton. Records relating to lands formerly of the priory in Little Tew are catalogued in E.C.R. vol. 19, and those in Fringford, which were attached to the estate at Cottesford, in E.C.R. vol. 26.
