It is necessary that the school be finished with all speed, the use of it not being to be wanted without great inconvenience. Towards the charge there is a legacy of Mr Rosewells of 3001. The Provest and fellowes notwithstanding many other extraordinary concurring charges will pay 5001. For the rest they intreat the assistance of their friends, such as have had their education there or are otherwise well disposed to promote good work of publique use, and have kindnes to that College and school.[†]

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Introduction

The first hundred and twelve items mentioned in this volume continue the catalogue of records relating to College property in Berkshire and Buckinghanshire that has appeared in Eton College Records vols. 33 to 36, 38 and 41. 4

The reason for presence among the archives of Eton College of copies of Court Roll and other manorial documents concerning copyhold lands in Yateley, Hampshire, (113-147), has not been established. This property was part of the manor of Grondal. The interest that brought the records to Eton was evidently concerned with the holdings that had belonged to the Hockley family from the time of Charles I. Why these should have been brought to the notice of Mr Browne, the College Registrar, at the beginning of the mineteenth century (146-7), is not clear.

The manor of Grondal had belonged to the Bishop of Winchester from whom, in the tenth century, it passed to the monks there. A charter of Edgar of 975-4 confirmed it to them. In Domesday Book it is described as being held by the Bishop for their support. In 1264 the Bishop gave up almost all claim to it. It remained to the Prior and Convent till the Dissolution and was thereafter granted to the newly constituted Dean and Chapter of Winchester. At the Commonwealth it was sold to Nicholas Love, one of the regicides; at the Restoration it was restored to the Dean and Chapter.^{1.}

The neighbouring manor of Farnham, Surrey, meanwhile, had been the property of the Bishop of Winchester since perhaps the seventh century.². Long continued disputes

between the Bishop and the Monks of Winchester resulted in an amicable settlement in July 1284, after trial before the king and his Council at Aberconway.^{3.} The Bishop, as has been said above, then renounced his claim to the manor of Grondal, but retained, by this agreement, a right to the attendance of the Frior's bondmen twice a year before the Bishop's steward for the View of Frankpledge at Blackheathland in the manor of Farnham. It is odd that there should be a Farnham manor document (119) among the Grondal copies of Court Roll here described. It does not appear to concern Grondal tenants or to have anything to do with their ancient obligation to attend the Farnham View of Frankpledge.

It does, however, happen to show the change of ownership that took place at Farnham, as at Grondal, during the Commonwealth. "With the abolition of episcopacy", says the Victoria County History, "followed by the Long Parliament ordinances of 1646, the estates of the bishops fell into the hands of the highest bidders. Farnham Manor was sold on 25 September 1648 to John Farwell and James Gold for 81451: 85." Our document, dated 1651, shows the new lords in possession.

The Grondal records (113, 114 and 118) contribute a word that is unknown to the Medieval Latin Dictionary, <u>pediel</u>. This may be presumed to be an attempted latinization of the word "pightle", meaning a small field or enclosure.
