At Whitsuntide he spent an afternoon at Cottsford walking the field with Mr. Allen's tenant, Goodson, a good judicious husbandman, who showed him above a hundred acres newly ploughed the last season and sowed with oats, over which the tenants and inhabitants had before free pasturage. The lord is Sir Rowland Litton. Sir Richard Farmer, in the right of his lordship of Hardwique adjoining, claims a sheep rake for 400 sheep within the grounds of Cottsford, and brought his sheep to graze on the corn of the newly cultivated plot, some of which were pounded by Sir Rowland's bailiff. Since which, Sir Rowland has sold the land and crop to Sir Anthony Cope who has composed the matter with Sir Richard who now drives his flock through his own grounds another way. This prejudices the College right of inheritance and the College tenants make no resistance.

Sir Henry Savile to Sir Anthony Cope 11 August 1606 Good Sir

Havinge receaved advertisement of late of divers wrongs done at Cotsforde (thoroughe the sufferaunce of the Colledge farmar and teanaunts there) as welle by the freeholdars of the same as also by soome of your teanants in Heathe, whereof I thought it fitt to make you acquainted assueringe my selfe that you will sea redresse of any wrongs done by them without anye further meanes to be used. Firste ther is a peece of grownde called Cuckolds Burrowe or Cuckolds Furres which Mr Pettye about viij yeares paste did plowe uppe and sowe with corne, and when harveste came, the parson of Cotsforde demaunded tythe, and at that tyme Mr Pettye was also farmar of Heathe tythe, and for coveteousnes of savinge the tythe to him selfe saied that that peece of grownde was belonginge to Heathe and therfore shoulde paye no tythe to Cotsforde, since which tyme it hathe bine used as Heathe grownde (thorough his sufferaunce) and never before.

Now this years one Robert Paine of Heathe hathe plowed uppe a peece of grownde lyeinge in the waye that leadethe from a certaine gate, called Holte gate, to the common, where neither was nor is any markes at all as your other lands have, and alwayes, ever since anye man can remember, the teanaunts of Cotesforde have tyed ther horses and fedd their cattaile there. Also the same againe hathe lykewise plowed uppe this yeare an other peece of grownde uppon Cotsforde common containinge aboute x acres which never was plowed before, and in tymes paste had no markes at all for Heathe lande (as wille be proved by sufficiente witnes) untill of late yeares that Heathe men have used to goe when and where they will in Cotsforde feelde to marke grownde at their pleasuer, without anye of the inhabitaunts of Cotesforde goinge with them. Since Michaelmas laste the tenaunts of Heathe have divers tymes brought ther sheepe into Cotsforde feelds and fedd them there contrarye to all right, for they have no right of common ther, nor never before this tyime presumed to feede

anye cattaile in Cotsforde feelds.

All these wronges, and manye moe, have our farmar and teanaunts of Cotsforde suffered, and never saied anye thinge to them, nor never made us acquainted with any sutche dealings: wherfoore nowe my desier is that the corne growinge uppon these severall peeces of grownde may with your good lykings be sett uppe by it selfe in sume honeste manes custodye untill our cumminge to Cotsford which wilbe (god willinge) verye shortlye, where I woolde be glade yf please you to intreate your companye, or elles to meete in anye other place where you shall thinke fitte to the intente wee maye further conferre of thes matters. Ande in the meane tyme that the tythes be paied to Cotsforde as of right they ought to be. And so with moste hartye commendacions in haste I betake you to God from Oxford the xith of Auguste 1606.

Sir Anthony Cope to Sir Henry Savile 15 August [1606] Sir,

I thought good to advertise you that a man somwhat in yeares pretending to be your servant hath bin lately at Cotsforde whoe hath made such an inquirie of all the landes that I have latelie bought of Sir Rowlande Litton lying within the boundes of that feilde that as I heare he animatethe the tenants by warranty from you seeking to incourage them to enter uppon my possession to cutt downe my corneland hath made a great garboile there and disturbance among the tenants such as

if I did not seeke to appease it will cause much bloudshedde peradventure with the losse of their lives - He was with me uppon Tuesdaye last. I demaunded of him by what authoritye he came thither, whether he had any letter from you or any warrant to authorize him to enter uppon my grownde for that I perswaded my self of your love that you would have acquainted me either by letter or some freindlie meanes assureing you that I would have bin verye readie to hearken to any reasonable motion you shoulde have made wheruppon as I tolde him I suspected that he was not your man nor came not from you. These were my last speeches to him that you and I when wee mette should agree for there is nothing equall or indifferent but I durst referre unto you knowing your uprightnes that ways and as I assured my self your love to me. This man toulde me that a seanight after St Michaeles day you purposed to be at Cotsforde where I tolde him I woulde meete you for the ending of these things I hope to your likeing and myne. Thus he used me. He returned presentlie backe againe to your tenants and hath incouraged them to cutt downe a great deale of barley which because yt is not ripe it is lost both to them and me. They came with a great companie in riotous manner and unlesse it be for your sake I doubt not but that I shall take that course which by laws I may and shall cause them to repeat yt. The corne was sowed peaceablie by my brother Litton and the land afterwards and corne allsoe was solde to me. Therfore if you thinke that you have good title to the same lett the same be vewed by indifferent men and I will answere the valewe of yt if yt fall out by the lawe to be due unto you. Thus desireing your answere by this bearer with my lovinge commendatyons unto you I wishe you well, from Hanwell this 15th of August

Frauncis Temple to Sir Henry Savile, giving an account of his visit to Sir Anthony Cope when inquiring about wrong done to the College in Cottsford. " ... and further he saied he did not knowe whether I was your woor: [ship's] sarvante or not. and askede me whether I had anye letter or anye authoritye in wrightinge from you, wheruppon I showed his woor: [ship] what earneste busines you weare in by the King's commaundement at Oxforde, and that I came suddainly awaye wen you weare goinge to meete your companye about the busines committed unto you. and therfore havinge no tyme to wrighte, you delivered me my message in sutche wise as I showed his worshipe. Then he saied I was a disturbar and their paused. After this I showed him that his teanaunts of Heathe had broughte into Cotsforde feelds a great number of sheepe, and that he himselfe had lykwise sent manye sheepe thither to be pastured, wheras neither the lorde nor anye inhabitant of Heathe had ever anye sheepe goinge ther, for Heathe land befor. To wch he saied (I marye) I doe it in my owne righte ... "

We sincerely congratulate her and you on the events having so happily taken place; and that a termination is at past put to so long a course of anxiety; which indeed I have often experienced myself, tho' never quite for such a length of I should have made an enquiry long ago into the state you time. were in, could I have met with any opportunity of conveying to you my neighbour's treatise on the cow pox; which I provided myself with, as we returned by Oxford, and where I was informed that there was no immediate communication between that place and Eton. I hope it will afford much satisfaction both to Mrs Roberts and yourself; as I understood you intended to inoculate some of your little folks with the vaccine matter. Your operator will, I hope, have been fully conversant in the practice, and be able to pronounce absolutely on the genuiness of the pustule; there is a spurious sort so much resembling the genuine, that it requires no small degree of experience to discriminate: the practice has suffered some discredit in a few instances in this neighbourhood, merely on this account. Were I to inoculate a child of my own with the cow pox, I would certainly repeat the operation, in due time afterwards, with the small pox, in order to be on a more absolute certainty ... "

The property to which the documents catalogued in this volume relate was acquired by Eton College in 1531 by a deed of exchange with the Crown of 5 September, confirmed by a patent of 26 December. In return for the Hospital of St. James the College was granted inter alia the manor of Chattisham, . co. Suffolk, with its appurtenances in Chattisham and elsewhere in the said county (nos. 40A, 40B). These lands had formerly belonged to the Priory of Benedictine nuns of Wix, co. Essex, which was one of the religious houses dissolved by Wolsey in 1525 for the foundation of his colleges (no. 145). possessions of the Priory of Wix at first went to the Cardinal's College at Oxford, but on 1 August 1528 the dean of that college, John Higden, granted them inter alia to the College of Ipswich. 2. But shortly afterwards the cardinal was in disgrace and the lands escheated to the King, who used them for the purchase of what became, and remains, the nominal and official residence of the court.

The deeds that came to Eton by this exchange date back to
the reign of Richard I. It may well be that all the deeds
belonging to the period that Idonea was prioress (nos. 2-8) are
of the twelfth century. When the events are considered which
took place between the suppression of the number of Wix and
the acquisition of the property by Eton College, it is not surprising to find that the muniments did not reach the College whole.
A number of deeds was left behind in the Treasury of Receipt.
They may be traced in the P.R.O. Catalogues of Ancient Deeds.
Similarly the Court Rolls at Eton of the period of the priory
(nos. 103-108) can be supplemented by Court Rolls in the Record
Office.

The large number of field names which appears in these records, and indeed in this catalogue, may be compared with a list of Chattisham field names printed in The Bast Anglian

New Series vol. IV p.246. The New English Dictionary gives the following information concerning the apple trees described as growing in 1650 around Chetsham Hall (no.129(3)) and said to have been planted by the tenant 80 years ago. "Paremanes" appear in Gerard's Herbal (1597) where there are references to the "sommer Pearemaine" and the "winter Pearemaine". Drayton's Polyolbion (1612) refers to "the Pearemaine which to France long ere to us was knowne." "Harveys" are reputed to be named after Gabriel Harvey who died in 1630; a kind of cooking and cider apple. The first reference given is dated 1640. Evidently Mr. Barker, the former tenant, had been interested in the growing of apples though it hardly seems that the Harveys can, in 1650, have been planted 80 years ago. From a century later there is a quotation which advises the cultivation of precisely the trees here mentioned. "Your apples must be Pippins, Pearmains or Harveys" (Comp. Fam. Piece 1741).

There is some expressive correspondence in this volume including a letter from one of the compilers of the Authorised Version of the Bible (no.154). The College had dealt with Hoare's bank for nearly fifty years at the time of Mr. Highmore's letter of 2 December 1761; having first become its customers in 1714.

My speeches concerned his puttinge me from the sale of the wood havinge offred more or full asmuch as he sold yt for) ever assuringe my selfe that your mindes was to preferre your fermors before strangers: And if I had not offred so much as I did, I am perswaded you had not had the price you have for yt. Your lands in Hintlesham do lie fitter for me than for you, and if yt shall stand with your good likinge to take lands in exchange for that which shall lie hedge to hedge with your other lands in Chattisham, and in full equalitie with yours in Hintlesham, I will be very willinge in any reasonable sorte to performe that which is fit therein, the rather I now move yt is because the Parlyament is at hand, which without an Acte, some holde your house cannot alyen or exchange. So desiringe your answer and your love, with the rest of your socyetie I committe you to the Almightie. Hyntlesham this iiij th of February 1609.

Sir,

I receaved your letters sume dayes agoe, but had no opportunitye to wrighte to you againe, but by sume who this tearme tyme might convaye it to you. If our Bailyfe offered you unkindnesse, it was without ower knowledge or advice, yf he made the moaste of it, so was our commission. I knowe by myne owne experyence ther be many gent: especiallye of y greter sorte, that unlesse they maye have the offer of anye thinge that is neare them at their owne price, they wild to redye to pick a quarrell uppon sume by matter. I proteste I knowe not nor never hards that you wears so to be towched. but the common fassion of the worlde makethe me sume what jealous ther might be sume sutche thinge. Suerly sir, wheras you saye yf you had knowne our minde, wee no other mynde, but onlye to have it soulde to the moste benefitt and rather to the farmer then to others: yet not so that his greatnes shoolde stoppe other men from offeringe that the full vallue might be made. What issue or satisfaction wee shalle have by lawe, seeinge it hathe pleased you, at your firste enteringe to be a teansunte to putt us to a suite in lawe for that we wee holde to be our undoutted right we must leave to our betters to determine: once I am suer the Colledge hathe hitherto sette downe whethe losse by your meanes.

For exchange we you tendar, it mays please you to understands that I have bine always scrupulous that ways, The title for the lands wee holds form the Kings of this Realme wee presume (havings continued so longs in our quiet possession) to be good: Anf yf any be evicted from us by laws, it is not our falts, yf wee exchaings uppon a woorse tytle, as in this searchings worlds, the bests lawyear in Englands can give us no warraunts, that that may and wilbs

imputed unto me. Besides, this parliamente (without which as you rightly conceave nothinge can be donne) hathe showed them selves very averse that waye, havinge as I undarstande flatly refused to ratefie an exchaunge betweene Trinitye Colledge in Cambridge, and Sir Thomas Munson, albeit the exchainge apparently advantageus for the Colledge. And lastly yf in the other poynts wee might be satisfied wherin I thinke ther is and wilbe greate difficultye, thoughe noe impossibilitye, I showlde have expected a better particular of the lands you woolde give in liew, then onlye sutche generalle tearmes as are in your letter, to have made the reste of the Colledge acquainted therwithall, whiche now uppon so rawe an offer I have forborne to doe.

To these points I will attende your aunswer at your next occasion, and for the matter betweene the Colledge and you, wee are not so desierus of lawe, but we shoolde be mutche gladdar to have reason without it, which lyethe in your hands only to performe; where I leave it, and yourselfe, which my harty commendacions to the protection of the almightye.

Your letter to me unlesse it wer by error or otherwise antedated came not to my hands in iiij monithes after the wrightinge, wherof I thought it not amisse to advertice: that heereafter yf you have occasion to sende any you may make choyce of an other carryer.

Sir.

I have indeavored to bringe the refrectory tenaunts of $y^{\underline{\Theta}}$ Mannor of Chattisham Hall to a fayre agreement, They be three in number, namely Mr Parker for certayne freehold lands lyeing in Hintlesham and Washbrook in twoe parcells which have paid one parcell 2s: 7d per annum, the other parcell 2s: 8d per annum and were sometymes Nicholas Tymperlyes Esq. and late Bennetts Bestony Barkers and Thomas Cornwallis.

The second is one Mr Coppyn for certayne freehold lands lyeinge in Bylstone sometymes Cuttburds and have payde the yeerly rent of 3s: 6d per annum. The third is the lands freehold late of one Edm: Talmach and synce Ralfe Talmache lyeing in Ottlye or Swylland you next town adjoyning, weh soe farr as I can understand are purchased by one Mr Smyth and soe be now in his possession and have paid the yeerly rent of 3s: 6d or 4s per annum formerly.

Theis three men make one and the same answer to me, and though they live att a distant a sunder, yet they plead one plea, and hold the same resolution, which is this, that they hold noe lands of this manner that they know off, But to prevent

suytes if you pleas to send me anye note out of the Rolls or survey booke of such lands as we charge them withall and respectively, They will show me or anye councell to whom I shall referr my selfe ther wryteings and evidences and soe make itt out by the names and titles of the parcells of lands they be charged withall, and iff it can this way be made appear They will immediately yould itt. But for them to be at you charge of councell to come to treat with you, without this ther request they will not. Or if the College will trust anye councell heere with the survey booke they will then be content to referr themselves: and, Sir, I thinke Mr. Mylton a master in Chancery dwelling in this towne, whom I understand you know, would doe you and the College this servyce and see to be returned agains eyther by him or me as you think fitt. Sir, of this I humblie desyre an answer as speedily as you thinks fitt by a letter directed to me William Flack dwellinge in Ipswich, And Sir such a letter by yo post can not miss comeing safe to my hands and in the interim I am Sir your humble servant

Yours I received about a weeke agone, and the best information I can give the Coll: of the vallue of our liveing heere at Chattisham is, that the parrish is small and the valluation of the wholl towne is very little above 30011. per annum and our customes lessen the lyveinge some thinge considerable as our meadows but a great an acre and borders about cornefeilds neething orchyards xviijd and the like, the taxes very high in this hundred that I cannot uppon my best inqiry fynde it to be above 2411. per annum besydes the last

incumbent hath left it see much in debt to the Kinge, never pd any tenths wch come to xs : iiijd per annum besydes the annuall fees for non payement he hath alsoe left the house and barne in most miserable dilapidations weh will cost uppon our best computation at least 30 or 4011. We fear a sequestration for y tenths, we are wholly destitute at present but what the court will does at Easter Generalls wee know not; The cure was served [by] Mr Croply Mr Sevenicrofts brother in lawe for some yeers last past by consent [of] the court and Dr Pepper chanceller of Norwich every Sundays, the rest was allowed by there order for towards a lyveling for Mrs Sevinicroft, but some parte was to be allowed tow[ards] repayres, but noethinge done, though often promysed. As to my new leases sendeinge downe went you mention in your letter to be done, you please to send them by Mr Pupplett and he maye see me seale heere as Mr Ventruse did the last tyme, I hope you have according to my desyre and as of right ought to be the old ones wen I sealed, cancelled.

The opinion of John Bankes, Attorney General, is written, and signed, on the last page.

"The last sommer one William Dove (uppon prosecution of the lady Salton) distreyned the cattell of Richard Flacke the Colledge tenant for the somme of 411 for the arrerages of a rent of 10s: 1d per annum chardged (inter alia) uppon the heires and executors of John, Earle of Oxon to be issueing out of landes in Chattesham behinde for fowerscore and three yeeres att Michaelmas anno 5° Regis Caroli, longe before which chardge

Item I gyve to the Colledge of Eaton the somme of threscore pownds uppon condytion that they doe graunt a lease of there lands in Hintlesham unto Nycholas Tymperley, esquyer, lord of the Mannor of Hintlesham or unto his heires for the terme of xxj yeres at the same rent yt is nowe letten at, And the lease to begyn at thend of the lease which is nowe in beinge. Otherwyse I will that my guift to be voyde.

And my will, and mynde is, That all the said severall sommes by me gyven as aforesaid videlicet, To the church-wardens of Hintlesham, Cobdock, Washbrooke, Chattysham and Burstall, Eaton Colledge, to Clement Manninges, to Thomas and John Carleton, amountinge to the somme of one hundred and forty pownds shalbe payed by Nycholas Tymperley of Hintlesham in the county of Suff., esquier, his heires or assignes within two yeres next after the decease of Ellen my wyfe.

Lastly I doe ordayne constitute and make my speciall good frynd and master, Nycholas Tymperley of Hintlesham in the county of Suff., esquier, and my welbeloved frynd Martyn Nutman, of Burstall in the said county, executors of this my last will and testament. To whom for and towards the performynge of this my will and meaninge, I doe gyve all my lands and tenements to them and ther heires and all my movable goods chattells debts and redy mony whatsoever before herein by me not gyven and bequethed. 1600 Manerium de Chetsham.

Edmund Thomson tenaunte of the said mannor with holdeth for the Kings Colledge of Eton a certaine quite rent of xvjd per annum and hath with holden the same by the space of xx years nowe last past or nere uppon.
